In the poem, 'I know why the caged bird sings', Maya Angelou talks about two states of the birds, the first state is the birds experience when he is liberated and another state is the time when the bird is inside a cage and is craving for liberation. The caged bird could not get the opportunity and could stand continuously "on the grave of dreams" pining with "nightmare scream" most of the times. Both the wings are clipped together under a cage and both her feet were extremely tied together, thus could not liberate herself completely and could sing only for her freedom.

In this poem, if we take into account the caged bird as a teacher in this respect, there can be a new interpretation of this poem. The bird before the freedom of COVID-19 could get the opportunity to perform innumerable thoughts like the free teacher before the lockdown. Before the COVID-19 lockdown phase, a teacher could take classes in schools, colleges and universities.
